Consultant Psychiatrist and Specialty Clinical Director

Dr Sujeet Jaydeokar is a Consultant Psychiatrist for Cheshire and Wirral Partnership NHS Foundation Trust. He is also a Clinical Director for the Learning Disabilities, Neurodevelopmental Disorders & Acquired Brain Injury Care Group within CWP. He, along with Dr Mahesh Odiyoor, was instrumental in setting up the Centre for Autism, Neurodevelopmental Disorders and Intellectual Disabilities (CANDDID). He is a Fellow of the Royal College of Psychiatrists and is also the Financial Officer on their Executive Committee. His particular areas of interest are in Service Development and the phenomenological aspects of Autism.

Dr Ken Courtenay FRCPsych MRCGP Consultant Psychiatrist in Intellectual Disabilities, Barnet, Enfield and Haringey Mental Health NHS Trust

Dr Ken Courtenay completed his higher training in the Psychiatry of Intellectual Disability in St. George's Hospital Medical School London with The Professor Baroness Sheila Hollins. Dr Courtenay works as a Consultant Psychiatrist with adults with Intellectual Disabilities in Haringey, London in a community service. His clinical interests are in mental health in people with Intellectual Disabilities and neurodevelopmental disorders, such as Autism and ADHD. Since 2018, he has been the Chair of the Faculty of Psychiatry of Intellectual Disability in the Royal College of Psychiatrists.



Dr Dougal Julian Hare, BSc (Hons) MSc (Econ) MSc ClinPsyD Reader, Cardiff University

Dr Dougal Julian Hare attended Keswick School before going to Durham University to read psychology. Following post-graduate studies in social psychology at the LSE, he moved into clinical psychology and undertook clinical training and further research studies at the University of Leeds. He has worked around the UK as a consultant clinical psychologist for the NHS and in the charitable and private sectors, specialising in working with people with intellectual and developmental disabilities with specific interests in behavioural phenotyping, metabolic disorders, syndromic autism, catatonia and sleep. He is currently Reader in Clinical Psychology at Cardiff University, where he is Research Director for the South Wales clinical psychology training programme.

Dr Sarah Cassidy Assistant Professor, School of Psychology University of Nottingham

Dr Sarah Cassidy is an Assistant Professor at the University of Nottingham. She currently leads a research program exploring mental health problems, suicidal thoughts and suicidal behaviours in autistic adults. She works in partnership with the autism community, those bereaved by suicide, and leading autism and suicide prevention charities, to identify research priorities, and campaign for changes to policy and practice, to better understand and prevent suicide in autistic people. Her research is currently funded by the Economic and Social Research Council, Autistica, and the International Society for Autism Research.

Dr Ceri Woodrow Clinical Psychologist

Cheshire and Wirral Partnership NHS Foundation Trust

Dr Ceri Woodrow qualified as a Clinical Psychologist from the University of Manchester in 2009. She has worked with people who have intellectual disabilities since qualifying and has a keen interest in clinically focused research to enhance clinical practice. She is currently researching the Dynamic Support Database Clinical Support Tool in relation to its inter-rater and face validity. Currently she is a Professional Advisor for Psychology within CWP and has the pleasure of working at 'Greenways', an inpatient assessment and treatment unit for people with intellectual disabilities and complex challenging behaviour.

The all new CANDDID training modules have been funded by the Local Workforce Action Board via the Cheshire and Mersey Transforming Care Partnership which are aimed at family members, unpaid carers, support workers and personal assistants who support children, young people or adults with learning disabilities, autism or both.

Accessed via the CWP Virtual Academy on Moodle, training is providing via interactive online modules, supported by facilitated sessions and is free to access for parents, family and other unpaid carers and each aims to provide practical advice, solutions and tips. There is a small charge for paid staff who will gain a certificate on completion.

Topics include:

- Communication
- Law, Ethics and Safeguarding
- Stopping Over-Medication of People with Learning Disabilities
- Healthcare for people with learning disabilities or autism
- Family and carers as partners
- Supporting children and young people
- Preparing for adulthood

Dr Rebecca Swarbrick

Clinical Psychologist

Cheshire and Wirral Partnership NHS Foundation Trust

Dr Rebecca Swarbrick works with people with learning disabilities in her role as a clinical psychologist for CWP. Rebecca works with people who have Autism and a Learning Disability and have come into contact with forensic and criminal justice services and her work in this role focuses on enhancing people's lives through strength based approaches. Her clinical and research interests also include the cultural factors within hospital settings, sexuality for differing groups, clinical risk sharing and risk mitigation and the experience of clinicians who experience mental health challenges.

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Dr Teresa Tavassoli Lecturer in Developmental Psychology University of Reading

In 2007 Dr Tavassoli completed her psychology training in Germany at the University of Constance before finishing her Ph.D at the University of Cambridge. From 2016-2017 Dr Tavassoli has worked at the University College London (UCL), and started as an Assistant Professor at the University of Reading in 2017. Dr Tavassoli's research is dedicated to deepening our understanding of sensory reactivity in autism spectrum disorder (ASD) and its variation across the entire population.

Professor Taj Nathan Director of Research and Clinical Effectiveness Cheshire and Wirral Partnership NHS Foundation Trust University of Chester

For the past 18 years Professor Taj Nathan has worked as a Consultant Forensic Psychiatrist in the North West of England. In 2015, he was additionally awarded the title of Visiting Professor at Chester Medical School, University of Chester, and then in 2018 he was appointed Adjunct Professor at Liverpool John Moores University.
